How to Apply

- The 2025-2026 Foundation for LPS scholarship application opens Monday, December 1, 2025 and closes at 11:59 PM on Friday, January 30, 2026.
- Applications are submitted using Kaleidoscope – an online scholarship platform.
- Kaleidoscope can be accessed in two ways:
 - Visit the website <https://www.foundationforlps.org/scholarshipsandawards/scholarships/> and click “Apply Now.”
 - Visit the website www.lps.org and use the jump code G8YA and click “Apply Now.”
- Once on the scholarship platform you will click “Log In to Apply,” you will then be able to create an account or log in.
 - It is important to sign up with your personal email account — not your LPS email account – so we can contact you after graduation in the event you receive scholarship funding.
- After entering your personal information, click “I’m not a robot” and then “Submit.”
- Log in using your email and password.
- After starting an application, you may save your work and return later to finish.
- When are you are ready to submit, click “Apply.”



Tips to Make Your Application Stand Out

- Follow all directions.
 - Leave no blanks unless specifically indicated to do so. Be sure to include all supporting documents requested.
- Prepare your answers ahead of time.
 - Type your essays and application answers in a separate document so you can determine word count, check for spelling and grammar errors, and save your work for future scholarship applications. In your essay(s), tell the reader what makes you stand out as compared to other applicants.
- Proofread your application and essays.
 - Have someone else read through your application before you submit it. They may help identify errors or provide suggestions for improvement.

 - Request your transcript only after first semester grades are posted, expected on or around January 10, 2026.

Bill and Deb Sesow Memorial Scholarship

Award Amount: \$1,000

One scholarship awarded

Description

Bill and Deb met while attending the State University of New York at Cortland where they both earned their Bachelor's degrees in Physical Education in 1960. This set the foundation for their careers in education which impacted thousands of students.

After graduating from college, Bill served in a dual-role as a teaching principal in Vermont while Deb student taught in Hawaii. In 1961, they married, and two years later, they moved to Nebraska, where they would continue to teach until retirement. At UNL, both earned their Master's degrees while Bill also earned an Ed.D.

Bill was an elementary school principal in Bellevue, then a professor at UNL in Teachers College for more than 30 years. While at UNL, Bill served as a member of the Teachers College faculty and also advised masters and doctoral students choosing an administrative path as a school principal or superintendent.

Deb served as a special education teacher and administrator at LPS for more than 25 years, impacting the lives of many students with developmental disabilities. Deb was also instrumental in LPS's mainstreaming programs, integrating students with special needs into general education classrooms for part of the school day.

Their passion for education was passed on as children and grandchildren have made education their career.

Bryan Health Sciences Scholarship

Award Amount: \$1,550

One scholarship awarded

Description

This fund was established in honor of Bryan Medical Center to encourage talented young adults to pursue a profession in the health care field. Bryan Medical Center operates an acute-care hospital as well as several outpatient clinics, heart institute, and College of Health Sciences Center.

Criteria

- I am a Lincoln Public Schools senior
- I plan on enrolling in an accredited program leading to a bachelor's degree, certificate or registration in a health care field
- Priority will be given to applicants who have been accepted to Bryan College of Health Sciences (i.e. coursework or volunteer experiences or employment or participation in HOSA). Note: student must have Health Sciences declared major to receive scholarship.
- Preference will be given to students demonstrating financial need

Curtis J. FitzSimmons, M.D., Memorial Scholarship

Award Amount: \$1,000

One scholarship awarded

Description

Curtis J. FitzSimmons, M.D., an East High graduate ('85), was a board-certified infectious disease physician who passed away in 2017. This scholarship, created in 2019 by his parents, Bob and Jan FitzSimmons, honors the memory of Curtis by awarding a scholarship to a Lincoln student who has experienced the death of someone close to them.

Criteria

- I am a Lincoln Public Schools senior or graduate
- I am enrolling in a post-secondary education institution for the first time
- I have experienced the death of a significant person in my life
- Secondary preference to students who have participated in the Mourning Hope Grief Center's programs and services

David and Catherine Sellmyer Scholarship

Award Amount: \$4,000 (\$2,000 for the first year in college, and \$2,000 for the second year in college, given the student maintains good academic standing and progress toward their chosen career goals)

One scholarship awarded

Description

This scholarship was created in 2023 by Catherine and the late David Sellmyer to honor Catherine's LPS teaching career and David's career in physics at the University of Nebraska-Lincoln.

Cathy taught at Sheridan Elementary School for over 25 years. During her tenure she enjoyed teaching students at all levels of ability. Cathy was active in various committees. She was active in training student teachers in her classroom in cooperation with UNL. Cathy helped the district in writing curriculum for differentiated literature. She worked with teachers and administrators on scope and sequence for K-12 English. She facilitated a Chess Club for many years. She was a social studies liaison and was on the district's textbook selection committee. Cathy worked on Governor Kay Orr's Education Goals for 2000 Committee. After retiring, Cathy was an Adjunct Lecturer for the College of Education and Human Sciences and taught classroom management. She also worked as a supervisor of student athletes in study hall for the Athletic Department at UNL.

David had a profound impact on the UNL Physics Department during his nearly 50 years there. He was highly productive, authoring more than 700 publications, teaching undergraduate classes, mentoring 30 PhD. students, and 50 postdoctoral trainees. He became internationally known for his work related to magnetism, condensed matter physics, and nanotechnology. He served as the chairman of the department from 1978 to 1984 and was the founding director of the Nebraska Center for Materials and Nanoscience established in 1988. In these roles, he repeatedly brought science and engineering faculty together to write joint research proposals to federal agencies including the National Science Foundation, Department of Energy, and the Department of Defense. David secured funding from NSF to establish the Nebraska Nanoscale Facility. This Facility is part of 16 sites including Harvard, Cornell, Penn, Northwestern, and Stanford which constitute the National Nanotechnology Coordinated Infrastructure program to serve academia, industry, and federal laboratories related to nanomaterials fabrication and characterization.

David and Cathy moved to Lincoln in 1972. They were proud to become Nebraskans and raise their three children here. They want to encourage students who are interested in studying physics, chemistry or mathematics.

David Munro Spirit of a Silverhawk Memorial Scholarship

Award Amount: \$5,000

One scholarship awarded

Description

This scholarship has been established by family and friends of David Munro to assist a graduating senior who has excelled and been active in high school while persevering through a serious chronic disease(s)/condition(s) and plans to continue their education at an accredited four-year college or university.

David Munro graduated from Lincoln Southwest High School in 2012. He excelled academically, graduating in the top 15% of his class. David always sought to be an involved student in the high school he loved. He was a student ambassador, a member of National Honor Society, active in student council, varsity vocal music and the athletic program, serving as student manager for his beloved boys basketball team all four years. No one was a prouder Silverhawk! David was also blessed and especially grateful for the many meaningful relationships he forged with so many faculty and staff members at LSW that enriched his experience. David went on to graduate from Nebraska Wesleyan University.

David died in 2018 needing a heart transplant that did not come his way. From the moment of David's birth, he waged a daily battle with Hypoplastic Left Heart Syndrome, restrictive and obstructive lung disease, and other related health conditions as the years progressed. David underwent five major heart surgeries (the last during his senior year of high school) and endured countless procedures, interventions, hospitalizations and daily treatments to make life possible. His challenges were significant, but his resilience and perseverance in forging a path forward against unthinkable odds were exceptional. David often said, "You do what you have to do." Indeed, he did; and how he did it was remarkable. He lived his life with grace and joy, never a victim, never bitter.

David is remembered for his humor, compassion, intelligence, kindness, positive attitude, contagious smile, and his capacity to rejoice in the good fortune of others. This scholarship seeks to honor David by recognizing and providing financial assistance to other students whose paths are challenging due to a serious chronic disease or condition.

- I am a Lincoln Public Schools senior
- I plan to attend an accredited four-year institution of post-secondary education full-time
- I have been challenged by serious disease(s)/condition(s) diagnosed and treated by a physician
- I have a GPA of 3.0 or higher
- All things being equal, secondary preference is given to a senior at Southwest High School

Dayna's Dream Big Scholarship

Award Amount: \$2,000

One scholarship awarded

Description

This scholarship was created in honor of Dayna Carper Buss. Dayna inspired hundreds of students to "Dream Big" in her 14-year career as a 2nd grade teacher at Cavett Elementary, but she also touched the lives of countless others with her compassionate spirit and love of life. Dayna battled cancer for 18 months and never lost hope, passion, or dedication for teaching or for her students.

- Preference will be given to a student seeking a future focused on the development of children/youth

Award Amount: \$1,000

One scholarship awarded

Description

Created in 2020 by his West Point classmates and friends who wanted to remember Garrison C. Avery, his character, his values, and his accomplishments - the Garrison Avery Memorial Scholarship is awarded each year to students of character who have overcome obstacles and are still achieving their goals. Garrison C. Avery was a 2000 graduate of Lincoln High whose discipline, modesty, and compassion made an impression on many of his friends. He participated in ROTC at Lincoln High and demonstrated a talent for math and science. He loved to learn and mentioned the influence a combined physics and calculus class at Lincoln High had on his learning. The class prepared him for the method of teaching at West Point.

Harley J. Bair Scholarship

Award Amount: \$2,300

One scholarship awarded

Description

Harley J. Bair (1921-2011) grew up on a farm near Fairmont, NE. He worked for his room and board with his great uncle in Ord, NE, where he learned to be a machinist. In 1941, he was hired by Boeing Aircraft in Wichita KS, in the tooling division and helped develop the Boeing B-29 bomber. In 1955, Harley and his first wife Doris started Bair Machine Company and manufactured, among other things, shot+gun shell and rifle reloading equipment for hunters and sportsman which were shipped worldwide. After he sold this business, he started Bair Investment Company, a commercial real estate development company and had a Nebraska State Real Estate Brokers license for over 30 years. After Doris' death Harley married Shirley Vrba Shull. He was very appreciative of the numerous awards given to him from businesses and philanthropic organizations.

James T. Derr Biology Scholarship

Award Amount: \$1,000

One scholarship awarded

Description

This scholarship was established in 2003 in memory of James T. Derr by Pfizer Incorporated. James was employed for 17 years at Pfizer and was recognized as a research scientist and a global authority in the field of veterinary medicine. His scientific accomplishments included the development and licensure of Pfizer's global feline leukemia vaccine, Leukocell 2, ensuring that cats are protected from the deadly disease. He was also involved with the global harmonization of vaccine test standards. James Derr was a graduate of the University of Nebraska-Lincoln with a Bachelor of Science in Biology and Master of Science in Microbiology.

- I have a GPA of 3.0 or higher

Christine Grandgenett served for 17 years as Assistant Director at Big Brothers and Big Sisters and is the current CFO at The League of Human Dignity. Arlene Spader Oberg Scholarship

Description

Arlene Spader Oberg (1915-2010) attended Garr Creek one-room elementary school in rural northeast Lancaster County, Nebraska, and graduated from Havelock High School in 1932. She went on to the University of Nebraska until 1934, studying Latin, botany, and education, after which she taught in rural schools in Lancaster and Butler counties during the Dust Bowl. She and her pupils sealed cracks and crevices and wore handkerchiefs over their faces to fight the dust. In emergencies, she carried ailing pupils home to their farm families. After marriage in 1937, she continued to teach as a substitute and to grade examination papers for the Lancaster County Superintendent. In the 1940s and 1950s, living on a farm, she was active in County Home Extension clubs and in the school activities of her four children, always applying her skills and high standards as a teacher. She read to children at weekend reading groups in Waverly.

In the 1960s, she returned to the university to pursue a bachelor's degree and subsequently worked in the Lincoln Public Schools' administration. After retirement, she found joy in nature, whether planting trees or walking on the prairie, always eager to learn more. She and her husband, Howard Oberg, joined the Peace Corps in 1977 and served in El Salvador.

The Arlene Spader Oberg Scholarship is a \$1,000 award made annually to a senior at Lincoln Northeast High School (formerly Havelock High) or Lincoln High to support college studies in education or the social sciences. The award is made to help the student pursue a career that aligns with the lifelong dedication and high educational standards of Arlene Spader Oberg.

The award is likewise made in honor of all past Havelock High School graduates who have made positive contributions to their community, state, and country.

Criteria

- I am a high school senior at Lincoln High School or Lincoln Northeast High School.
- I plan to attend a two or four-year accredited college or university
- I plan to pursue a degree in teaching or social sciences

Anne S. Buntain Scholarship

Award Amount: \$3,500

One scholarship awarded

Description

This scholarship was created in memory of Anne Buntain, a 1982 graduate of Lincoln High School. Anne, who died in 1998, loved theater, film, and dance. She was a member of Lincoln High School Student Council, the Pomalinks Drill Team, Girls State, and National Honor Society. She enjoyed performing on the Lincoln High stage or Pinewood Bowl, and loved going to concerts and Broadway musicals.

Bob and Susan White Scholarship

Award Amount: \$1,000

One scholarship awarded

Description

Bob White retired May 21, 2021, ending a 43-year career as a teacher and coach where his work as a track coach at Lincoln High shaped generations of Links. The end of his teaching career reflected his teaching philosophy. He delayed his retirement by a year because of the Covid-19 pandemic so he could take the track team to the State Tournament one more time. In coaching, as in teaching, his priority was giving students every opportunity to learn, succeed, and grow. White began as an assistant coach in 1978 and took over as head coach in 1983. In 2018, Lincoln High won the State Tournament for the first time since 1960; they dedicated that championship to White. This scholarship was created in 2021 to encourage students to reach their full potential and to serve as a capstone of a four-decade career focused on helping Lincoln High students.

Coach Al Schnabel Memorial Scholarship

Description

Al Schnabel was a coach for 27 years and coached basketball at Lincoln High the last five years of his life. He believed in the importance of athletics but always believed that academics came first. He was recognized for his ability to motivate his teams and his students.

Donald J. Loudon Scholarship

Description

Donald J. Loudon was born in Grant, NE, in 1926, and his family eventually moved to Lincoln. Don graduated from Lincoln High School in 1944 where he graduated first in his class. He went on to the Naval Academy in Annapolis, MD. After fulfilling his service commitment and attaining the rank of Lieutenant, Donald remained in the Naval Reserves and eventually earned the rank of Captain.

While serving in the Navy from 1948-1953 he sailed under the Golden Gate Bridge in San Francisco. Looking up he said, "I'm going to live in this city someday." After his discharge from the Navy, he earned his MBA at Stanford University. He then worked as a stock broker in San Francisco until he retired in 1976. Don never had children of his own, but he was a generous uncle to his nieces and nephews, helping them with college and other expenses.

Donald was a strong believer that education can make a difference in someone's life. He graduated at the top of his class in high school, in the top third of his Naval Academy class, and top of his business school class. It was his education that allowed him to attain business and financial success. Donald's very generous gift to his family after his death makes this scholarship possible. His family wishes to honor his memory by helping others pursue their dreams through further education, just as their Uncle Donald did.

William 'Bill' Pfeiff was a Nebraska High School Hall of Fame member and a Husker football and track standout. Bill graduated from Lincoln High in 1936. During his senior year he was a Nebraska All-State Football player and set the Nebraska State shotput record that lasted for 19 years. Bill attended the University of Nebraska where he was a football and track standout. He served as a graduate assistant for Nebraska's 1941 Rose Bowl team and spent one season as Nebraska freshman football coach.

Bill returned to Lincoln High School in 1946 after his World War II military service and spent 10 years as teacher and football coach, winning three state championships. Coach Pfeiff also coached track for six years winning one state title. In 1955, Coach Pfeiff began his career as Dean of Boys and Director of Activities at Lincoln High. He spent 23 years as an administrator for the Links and served on the Nebraska State Activities Association Board of Control for several terms. The Lincoln High Football field is named after Bill Pfeiff –The Pfeiff Field.

Bill was married to Dorothy for 54 years and they had three children - all Links; William Paul (class of '60), Lawrence 'Biff' (class of '61) and Helen Elizabeth (class of '64). Through his years Coach Pfeiff was dedicated to and very proud of the Links!

The criteria for this award is inherent of the young men who compiled an outstanding overall record from 1946-1955 and subsequently are the basis for this award.

Throughout his life, Rod was passionate about the arts, becoming an active glassblower and jeweler in the Omaha art community. In his retirement, he volunteered at the Joslyn Art Museum, and supported El Museo Latino in Omaha.

Because of Matthew, and so many students like him, there has been an increase in awareness with students with special needs and an increase in interest in the field of Special Education. In his memory, his former staff members wanted a way to help support the students who have given their time, energy, and dedication to the Unified program at North Star as a small token of their appreciation.

Arlene Spader Oberg (1915-2010) attended Garr Creek one-room elementary school in rural northeast Lancaster County, Nebraska, and graduated from Havelock High School in 1932. She went on to the University of Nebraska until 1934, studying Latin, botany, and education, after which she taught in rural schools in Lancaster and Butler counties during the Dust Bowl. She and her pupils sealed cracks and crevices and wore handkerchiefs over their faces to fight the dust. In emergencies, she carried ailing pupils home to their farm families. After marriage in 1937, she continued to teach as a substitute and to grade examination papers for the Lancaster County Superintendent. In the 1940s and 1950s, living on a farm, she was active in County Home Extension clubs and in the school activities of her four children, always applying her skills and high standards as a teacher. She read to children at weekend reading groups in Waverly.

In the 1960s, she returned to the university to pursue a bachelor's degree and subsequently worked in the Lincoln Public Schools' administration. After retirement, she found joy in nature, whether planting trees or walking on the prairie, always eager to learn more. She and her husband, Howard Oberg, joined the Peace Corps in 1977 and served in El Salvador.

The Arlene Spader Oberg Scholarship is a \$1,000 award made annually to a senior at Lincoln Northeast High School (formerly Havelock High) or Lincoln High to support college studies in education or the social sciences. The award is made to help the student pursue a career that aligns with the lifelong dedication and high educational standards of Arlene Spader Oberg.

The award is likewise made in honor of all past Havelock High School graduates who have made positive contributions to their community, state, and country.

Sheila Evans taught at Omaha suburban schools before becoming a corporate executive for Sprint. She now serves as the Executive Director of the Allentown, PA Symphony.

Joe was born in 1925 in north Lincoln's University Place where he attended Huntington Elementary, Jackson High School and Northeast High School while also working as a pin setter at Lincoln Bowling Alley making \$3.00 a week. In 1943, he was drafted into the Army and served until 1946. He later worked at Lincoln's Cushman plant, sold cars and had several other occupations, including working at the Post Office for 20 years. Throughout that time, he bought properties. In 1978 he started the WWII Library and Museum. He did more than 250 WWII programs for more than 2 million people in more than 250 newspapers, 30 TV appearances and over 50 states and 52 foreign countries. Joe spent a lifetime gathering and collecting, and saving. His estate was worth nearly \$1 million at his death. He once went to 84 garages sales in one day collecting military memorabilia and eventually traveled the world to amass his collection. In 2003, he and his longtime companion Rose McCown opened a WWII museum along Interstate 80 in Greenwood, NE, sharing his collection with visitors each day and living in a nearby motor home at night. That museum closed in 2012.

For five consecutive years, Neal served as a volunteer assistant to instructor, Bob Freese, with the homebuilding class. As part of the class, students would build a home for an eligible family through the Lincoln Housing Authority. Each day of the school year, in all types of weather, Neal would faithfully arrive at the construction site ready and willing to teach students important skills of the construction trade. He also spent many personal hours outside of class working on final details to ensure the house was ready for the deserving family to move in on time. With his own professional experience in construction, coupled with his mastery of tools and passion for teaching others, especially students, he found great joy and sense of purpose in his volunteer role. Students loved Neal and he equally loved the students. Neal passed away unexpectedly on April 28, 2021, at the age of 67. He will best be remembered by students for his wit, “tricks of the trade” storytelling, advice, endless construction knowledge and giving spirit. Neal would do anything to help another person. He was giving of his time, expertise and skills, and much of the time, for no financial gain in return. He valued his formal post-secondary education and professional degrees, but he found just as much value in his trade work. To honor Neal and his memory, his family wishes to help a student at Lincoln Northeast High pursue a career in a trade and who also exemplifies the “giving spirit” of Neal.

Scott was diagnosed with anxiety and chose to handle it very well through proper nutrition, sleep, medical care, and exercise versus taking a destructive path. He was very brave and open to discussing his mental health in hopes to help others and to destigmatize mental illness. He truly overcame physical, social, and mental obstacles to succeed.

Scott was the life of the party. He loved nothing more than getting the room rolling with his infamous stories through facial expressions, voices, and hand gestures. Scott loved his family and his friends immensely and was a selfless giver. He would do anything for anybody and lived every day to provide the best life for his wife and children. This scholarship will recognize similar values in students today.

His life was tragically cut short in a car accident in 2018. Through this scholarship, Scott’s legacy will live on. The name of the scholarship comes from the symbol he would hold up in photos.

No one was a prouder Silverhawk! David was also blessed and especially grateful for the many meaningful relationships he forged with so many faculty and staff members at LSW that enriched his experience. David went on to graduate from Nebraska Wesleyan University.

David died in 2018 needing a heart transplant that did not come his way.
